He teaches Ph.D. seminar in research method and undergraduate strategic management courses. His research interests are about resource dependence theory, institutional theory, social networks, and strategies. His research has appeared in journals such as *Strategic Management Journal, Journal of Management, Journal of Management Studies*, and *Organizational Research Method*.

Tianxu Chen is an assistant professor of strategic management at Oakland University. He received his Ph.D. from LeBow College of Business at Drexel University. He teaches strategic management courses and his research focuses on the interface between entrepreneurship, innovation and competitive dynamics.
